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

Roosevelt went bear hunting while in the area, but saw no bears, so on the last day of the hunt his aides captured and tied up a bear cub to a tree. Roosevelt was incensed and ordered the cub untied. The president then rode his horse back to the camp to confront awaiting reporters.

Papers nationally carried the story of Roosevelt coming to the rescue of the small bear

Russian immigrant Morris Michtom saw a political cartoon of the president involving the bear cub and asked his wife Rose to make a toy bear to put in his candy store display window in Brooklyn, NY. Rose used brown mohair plush and stuffed it with fine wood shavings called excelsior. People crowded to see the bear with candy heaped all around it in the store's window.

Morris worried that the attention it was drawing might upset the president. He packed the bear in a box and sent it to the president with the note, "Dear Mr. President, I do not wish to seem disrespectful, but I would like to call my toy, 'Teddy Bear.'"

Newly added Finding Aids with reference to Liberty County include:

• Hull-Daisetta Rotary Club Collection (at Sam Houston Center) - The Hull-Daisetta Rotary Club was chartered on April 1, 1926, in Hull, Liberty County, Texas. In 2006, several local individuals and organizations began working to support renovation of the Hull-Daisetta Rotary Club building and preserve its legacy. It was moved to the grounds of the Sam Houston Regional Library and Research Center in June 2010 and now houses an exhibit on the heritage of Rotary clubs and community service in Southeast Texas. The Hull-Daisetta Rotary Club collection documents some of the activities of the club, with records including attendance and program records, membership rosters, corresponfinancial newsletters, photographs, posters, and artifacts. Materials date 1926-1979, 2010, bulk 1949-1979.

• R.D. (Bob) Evans Rice Production Slides (Sam Houston Center) - Robert Dawson (Bob) Evans was a prominent rice farmer in Devers, Liberty County, Texas. This collection consists of 275 color slides of photographs, maps, and statistical information pertaining to rice production in Southeast Texas, primarily Devers in Liberty County. Materials date 1961-1965.

During the day, guests will be treated to holiday-themed bounce houses, craft stations, face painters, balloon artists, reindeer food-making, letters to Santa, cookie decorating and more. Roosevelt replied to Morris that he could use the name "Teddy" bear, but couldn't imagine what good his name would do for him. Morris set up making Teddy Bears to sell in 1904, with Steiff from England also successfully presenting a teddy bear on the market.

The most commonly sold brands recently include Gund and Ty, Inc. Brands associated with teddy bears that enjoyed strong popularity in the 1980s and 1990s were Teddy Ruxpin and Care Bears, almost impossible to find at Christmas. Various TV shows and movies have featured a star teddy bear, including Super Ted and Mr. Bean.

Build-a-Bear stores have brought resurgence in popularity for the bears with a "constructed" bear of different materials and attire, even lights and voices. Of course, now, also fairly expensive! If you have children, grandchildren or like gifting children you are probably familiar with famous teddy bears in the national media market including Paddington, Rupert, and Sooty.

The most famous teddy

bear in the world is Winnie the Pooh, the honey-loving bear that appeared in 1926 and continues in popularity in books, movies and TV productions. My favorite Winnie the Pooh quote is, "If you live to be 100, I want to live to be 100 minus one day so I never have to live without you." Of course, you know, Pooh was speaking to his best friend, Piglet.

Two more personal favorites are, "You're braver than you believe and stronger and smarter than you think." And wisdom of a bear, "People say nothing is impossible, but I do nothing all day!"

Teddy quickly became one the most requested gifts of all time, with millions sold to date and about \$2 billion in sales. Morris Michtom who made that first teddy near went on to form Ideal Toys, a huge financial success.

The most expensive? A Steiff 17-inch Louie Vuitton teddy bear made in 2000 that sold at Christie's in Monaco for \$182,550.

Frankly speaking, sorry there was just one available. Now grin and bear it, while having a grrr-reat day!

Taylor vying for Republican Party Chair
